


Repercussions from the last Minister's management decisions for blue cod around the South Island are still being strongly felt. The traffic light system with stringent transiting rules applying to recreational fishers, imposed by Fisheries New Zealand, is causing lots of anxiety amongst fishers especially on the east coast. The new regime is not fair or practical.

This is another scenario where agreements with fishers were reached after consultation and then alternative decisions were made behind closed doors, surprising everyone.

There is no substitute for good process, and Fisheries New Zealand need to take responsibility for creating this anxiety unnecessarily and then address local fishers' concerns.

Our fisheries management team and local fishing club representatives continue to engage with Fisheries New Zealand to achieve a workable solution.




Once the excitement had passed we fired up the barbie and cooked up a feed for all on board It was a great day where heaps of fish was filleted and

Next Thursday there will be try-outs for the choir. They need all the help they can get.


Irving Benson and Jessie Carter were married on October 24 in the church. So ends a friendship that began in their school days.

Systemic problems in our fishing industry

It is past time for the New Zealand fishing industry to settle down and be accountable for their actions and their current poor fishing practices.

The introduction of the much-vaunted quota management system (QMS) in 1986 promised to curtail the illegal activities of commercial fish thieves.

'Once we have control of the quota you can trust us to manage our fishery in a sustainable manner' was the catch cry of the corporates. I well remember the leading names of those companies jostling to ensure their corporate snout was in the seafood trough.

So, what do we have now? Thirty-five years later the public of New Zealand is left with a string of broken promises along with the remnants of a struggling inshore fishery. One that has never fully recovered from the destructive fishing down practices during the seventies and early eighties when fishermen, in an effort to create catch history, would arrive at the docks with dock loads of freight, but with no buyers. They would weigh it in, have it officially recorded and either send it to the Sanford meal plant, or the local refuse dump as rotting fish. Or worse still, take it back out to sea and dump it before fishing for another freight that they in all probability would not be able to sell. True! and yes, it did happen.

Granted, many responsible fishermen were appalled at what they saw going on amongst the ratbags of our fishing community. Sadly, as the years of catch history were being recorded, many soon realised that as honest fisherman they were going to miss out, and so reluctantly joined in the plunder and misreporting because the MAF system was condoning it.

Today, as we look at the plight of many inshore fisheries, we are being told that the QMS is the saviour of our fisheries and it is an uncontrollable plague of recreational fishers who are the problem. Hark! the frequent commercial cry when Government fisheries managers looked at the state of many of our depleted inshore fisheries with an eye on reducing the total allowable catch (TAC). But it's not us Guv'-you have to control recreational fishers, increase the MLS and reduce bag limits so that they leave more fish in the water. They kind of skip over the fact that in doing so, it leaves more fish to prop up the TACC. The MLS system for commercial fishers is a farce. I don't care what they say about the new precision seafood harvesting (PSH) trawl method being the saviour, because reports I hear from the boats is that the method catches a shit load of small fish, with undetermined survival rates. As they say, a dead fish is a dead fish. Well, if this is the case remove the MLS off the 11 inshore fin-fish species and land the whole catch against the legitimate quota held. Having an MLS only legitimises high grading.

If we thought the inshore fishery was a rat's nest, then let's

cast our eye over the horizon and take a squiz at our deep-water fishery. This is a fishery where the public, including those pesky recreational fishers, have had no impact. One only has to read in MPI news on page 58 to find that our hardworking fisheries officers are being pushed to the limit with commercial fisheries offending. Admittedly, the recently introduced fisheries monitoring tools are now having an effect in detecting fish thieving over the horizon.

In this issue, three of our respected fishing companies all feature for fisheries offences. The Ministries recently introduced an electronic monitoring system of commercial vessels which has exposed these companies for bad fishing practices. One can only imagine just how bad it was before we had these new fisheries management tools. Is it any wonder our inshore fishermen are resisting the introduction of cameras on their vessels tooth and nail?

To add insult to public injury, what is of the greatest concern is when these offending companies are found guilty by the courts and along with fines, the offending vessel is forfeited to the Crown. Now here's the rub...

If it were a recreational fisher who has his vessel seized for offending and then forfeited to the Crown, the vessel and fishing assets are put up for tender in a public and transparent manner.

Not so for a commercial vessel involved in potentially millions of dollars of fisheries offending. The current law allows for the owner to seek relief from the Courts and pay a modest redemption value for relief from forfeiture. In effect, these companies can pay a pittance to get their multi-million-dollar vessel out of jail.

Which begs the question of why the differing standards? Surely if our justice system is to be seen to be fair and transparent then the vessel should be offered for public tender, with the company buying it back through an open market. But no. Somehow, we have allowed our fish lords to not only control our fisheries but also manipulate the wording of the Fisheries Act 1996, amendments, and current fisheries laws.

How can this happen you might well ask? Well, it's not hard to imagine how these things can eventuate when we have less than ten companies controlling 94 percent of our wild marine fishery. Plus, most of our inshore fishermen don't own quota, rather they have to buy ACE from the fish lords.

Is it now time for the Minister to repeal these dodgy parts of the Fisheries Act? We say it's past time...
